## **PREFACE**

The aim of this book is to provide Polish students of English with a concise guide to the basic problems of morphology in general, and to the system of English morphology in particular. In view of the fact that self-contained courses in morphology are being introduced at present in most English Departments throughout the country, the need for a text of this sort is now much greater than ever before. In fact, this need has already been satisfied to a certain extent by the recent publication of several excellent surveys (e.g. Bauer 1983, Scalise 1984, Bybee 1985). I was in the fortunate position of being able to consult, and draw upon, these sources when the writing of this manuscript was still under way. As a result, I could fully appreciate the limitations and shortcomings of my own work. Contrary to what I had planned, limitations of space and time did not allow me to give any detailed presentation of the current situation in the theory of morphology. However, I offer instead a fairly elaborate account of lexical derivation in English where, I hope, some new ideas are proposed, in terms of description and classification. Pedagogically speaking, the quite modest task of description seems, after all, to be vitally important for a handbook of this sort, in particular since such classic works as Marchand (1969) are neither readily available nor accessible to students.

Several people have earned my deepest gratitude for their help, encouragement and professional assistance offered to me while I was writing this volume. My sincere thanks go, in the first place, to Prof. dr hab. Edmund Gussmann of the Catholic University of Lublin who, having taught me linguistics and phonology for many years, ignited

my present interest in word-structure. Without his foresight and encouragement this book would not have been written at all. Prof. dr hab. Jacek Fisiak of the Adam Mickiewicz University in Poznań convinced me, at the beginning, of the purposefulness of my project and kindly offered his professional guidance and expertise. Prof. Robert Beard, who sponsored my 1985/1986 visit at Bucknell University, Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, gave freely of his time both as regards the form and content of this work. He shared with me unstintingly his knowledge and experience as a theorist and teacher of morphology. Dr. Anna Malicka-Kleparska and Mr. Aidan Doyle have read large portions of the manuscript, suggesting several improvements of the final version.
